From the Bishop's Desk...

A Season of Spiritual Renewal

In the year 1205, a then young Francis of Assisi entered a broken-down neglected church in the community of San Damiano. Francis knelt down in the rubble deep in prayer seeking God's guidance. As the story goes, Francis later described hearing a voice from the cross on the wall telling him to rebuild the church. In his youthful enthusiasm, he took this literally to mean fix and rebuild this dilapidated church in San Damiano.

He immediately got to work finding materials and gathering others to help with the repairs. It would be quite some time later, that Francis began to understand that something more profound was happening — an inward, spiritual renewing of his own spirit. He realized that his heart was being transformed, rebuilt, restored. His understanding of spiritual renewal was deeply connected to the healing, missional, transforming work of the church. The two could not be separated.

What he experienced personally in his faith-life was expressed outwardly in all that he did. He became known as one of the significant church reformers of his time. He challenged the status quo of institutions such as monastic communities who had accumulated vast amounts of property and wealth. He tried to emulate Christ in all things. He revealed God's inexhaustible love for the world with every person and creature he encountered. He engaged in significant dialogue with leaders of the church right up to the office of the Pope. He courageously met with a Sultan of the Muslim faith in a time of war and violence between the crusaders and Muslim soldiers. He boldly spoke to the Sultan, seeking only peace and friendship.

We are in a pivotal time in the history of the church. Some may even dare say that the church has been neglected or that it seems to be in ruins. We might even wonder what God might be saying to us as we look to the future and wonder what it will be like. We will need to be strong in our faith; to be rooted and grounded in God's love in order to do what God is asking of us. We can be assured of the fact that God is with us, and desires us to grow in our faith and to be open to all possibilities.

It is in this context, that I am inviting us as the Territory of the People to enter a season of spiritual renewal. It will begin Ash Wednesday, and will continue until we gather again in May 2026 at Assembly. It is an opportunity for us to learn how to embody what we believe with who we are and to whom we belong. As we learn together and take some time to be open to God's presence and guidance, may we discover the gift of God's transforming, healing love so that in turn, we may participate fully in the transforming and healing of our church and our world.

Prayer Corner




- * We pray for our neighbours, families and friends that they may experience the love of Christ in and through us.




